My inspiration is the workers who recycle garbage at landfill stations. The most recycled items are plastic bags. I stuffed cotton into the plastic bags to make them fluffy and three-dimensional, almost human-shaped, highlighting the problem that the plastic bags create in our environment.

PALOMA MORA Second year Materials: Magazines, tape, and thread Model: Gina Isela Ayala

I used magazines to emphasize their wastefulness. The production of paper magazines that are only looked at once is not sustainable. I had so many magazines saved, so I wanted to give them new life by repurposing them into a garment.

My inspiration comes from the African aboriginal tribe of Maasai, a Nilotic ethnic group in Kenya. They are well-known due to their geographic proximity to the African Great Lakes and their distinctive traditional garments. I used transparency with added color spray to capture their African style.

XIAOMIN DAI Second year Materials: Map, children paintings, slide toy Model: Grace Schramm

I chose the topic of childhood. When I was a child, I dreamt of traveling the world, the map being my first reference. Toys kept me company at night, helping me feel less alone. My materials reflect my childhood experiences, and I hope my garment will remind you of yours.

I am passionate about photography film due to its retro feel and unique texture. Inspired by the notion of memory, I used zippers and film in my design. Zippers symbolize opening and unlocking your memory, and film showcases images representing memories of the past.
